SHELBY'S FIRST RACING GT350 PROTOTYPE

Ken Miles quickly got the prototype GT350 up to speed at Willow Springs, turning laps that were faster than most SCCA A/Production competitors. Jerry Titus, the first journalist to drive the GT350, was almost as fast.





THE LEGENDARY 'FUN RACE CAR' CONCEIVED TO SUPERCHARGE STREET SALES

In January 1965, racing driver and *Sports Car Graphic* magazine editor Jerry Titus landed what would be an historic assignment: Join racers Ken Miles and Bob Bondurant at Willow Springs Raceway to put some laps on a prototype Mustang that Shelby American was turning into an SCCA B/Production race car. Petersen Publishing Company Photographer Darryl Norenberg captured on film what Titus called "a six-hour 'let's-see-what-breaks' run."

The Mustang was a hit at its April 1964 launch, but Ford Division Chief Lee Iacocca believed he could sell even more Mustangs if it were involved in racing. This was the era of Ford's "Total Performance" marketing, when the maker literally sold cars on Monday that won races on Sunday.

But when Iacocca wanted the SCCA to classify the Mustang as a sports car for competition, the sanctioning body refused. Iacocca then turned to Carroll Shelby for help.

A JOB HE COULDN'T REFUSE

Shelby was already very busy in the summer of 1964 developing a big-block version of the Cobra and running Ford's GT racing program. But given those close ties with the Ford Motor Company, he didn't feel he could turn Iacocca down. Plus, since Shelby's Cobras were dominant in SCCA A/Production racing, he knew the right people within the SCCA. They told him to build 100 for homologation without a rear seat, since true sports cars don't have back seats.

Shelby knew there wouldn't be enough demand for 100 pure racing Mustangs, so he planned to build street and competition versions. They would share many features, though the competition models would be true, stripped-down race cars.

For example, while both street and race Mustangs had no back seats, those destined for pure track duty were shipped to Shelby's Venice, California, facility without insulation or sound deadening, door window glass, a rear window, bumpers or hood.

The glass was replaced with Plexiglas, the bumpers and hood with fiberglass pieces. Norenberg's photos reveal that the placement and orientation of the hood scoop was still in flux when the car tested at Willow Springs. The thinking at the time was that its reversed orientation and rearward location would "draw high-pressure air from forward of the windshield," Titus said,

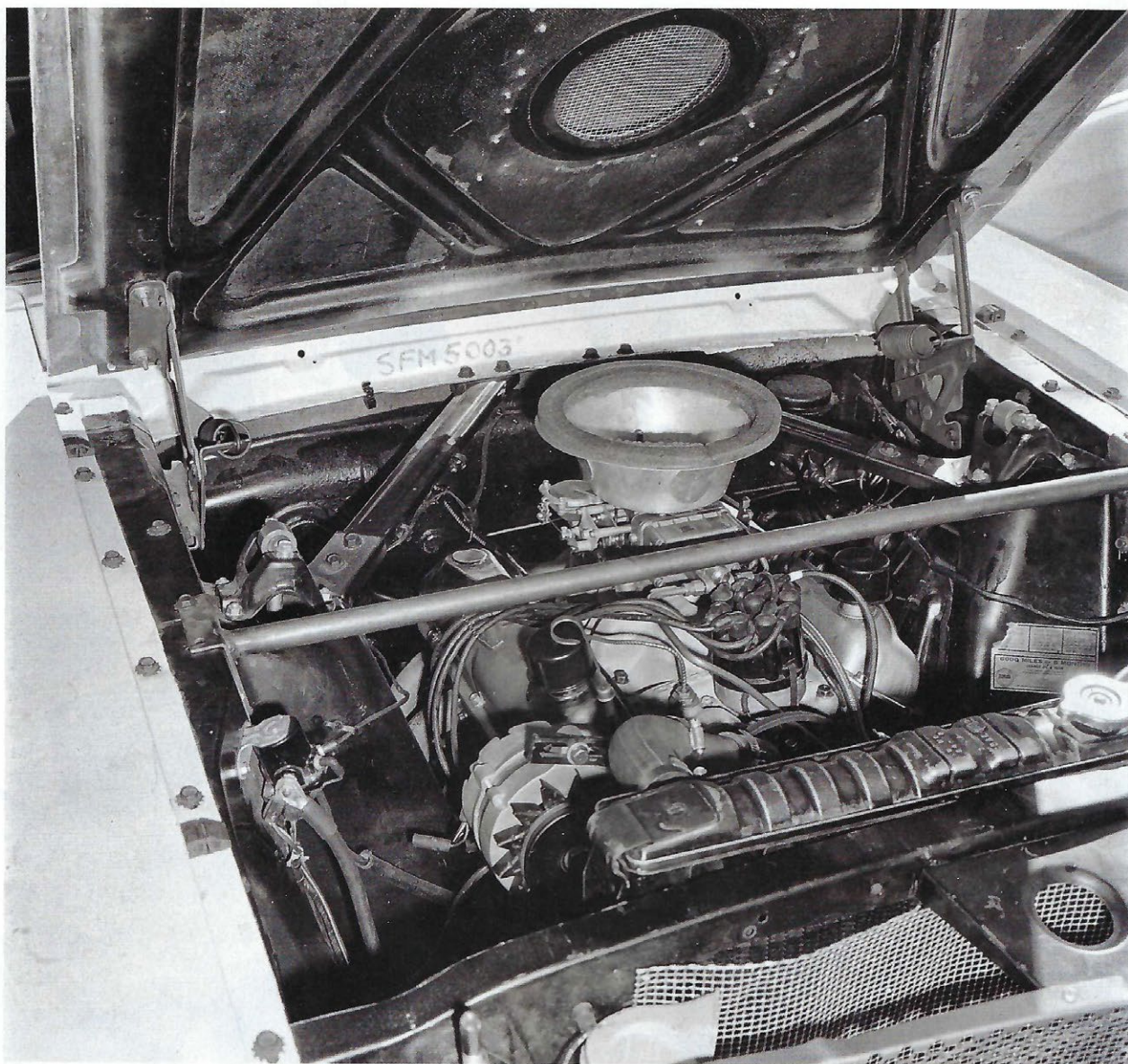
describing a system that rival Chevrolet called cowl induction. In final form, though, the scoop moved forward and opened at the front.

Also visible on the prototype are roughed-in rear wheelwells. Production Mustangs had either 13-in.-diameter wheels (for six-cylinder models) or 14s (for V8s). Shelby wanted 15s on Goodyear Blue Dot tires, which meant radiusing the wheelwells on both ends of the car. Opening up the rear fenders was complicated, as it affected the weld between the body and wheel tubs. It looks like the work was done hastily on this car to get it

Competition cars had Plexiglas rear windows. The gap between the roof and window's top was designed by Peter Brock to improve ventilation inside the car as well as air flowing over the roof.



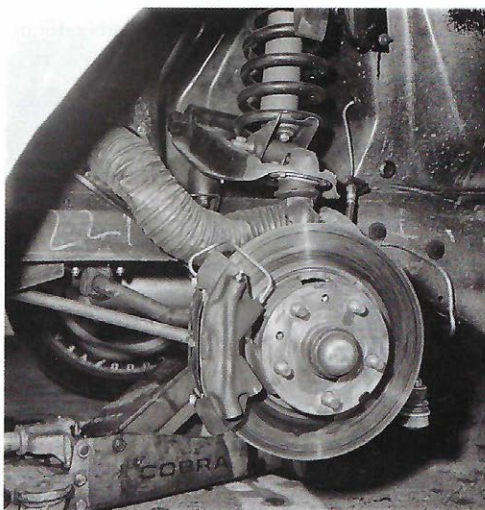
Street GT350s retained the Mustang's standard vinyl interior, while competition cars were stripped of insulation and most amenities. 5R002 was fitted with lightweight fiberglass racing seats and a simple dash layout with a big tachometer centered in the panel. The speedometer is under the dashboard.



ready for its track test.

To sharpen the Mustang's handling, Shelby's engineers relocated the front control arms and added rear torque arms that Titus described as "running above the leaf springs and into the unitized body near the front pivots of those springs." Shelby's Mustangs used heavy-duty suspension components, Koni shocks and a thicker front sway bar. The prototype's rearend "is of a Galaxie derivation, with limited-slip and heavy-duty axles." The front disc and rear drum brakes also came from fullsize Fords.

Street and race Mustangs shared Ford's 289ci Hi-Performance V8, though the "racing version is a hand-assembled unit with a special camshaft; roughly the same [engine] except for a grand's worth of tender loving care that net it a 20% increase in performance," Titus said. That TLC

included a four-barrel, 715-cfm Holley carburetor on an aluminum intake manifold, headers and a large, steel oil sump.

BUT WHAT TO CALL IT?

Shelby rated the engine at 306 hp. So where did the "350" in the car's name come from? Shelby recalled, in Rinsey Mills' authorized biography, that he had to sit through "one meeting after another to talk about what we were going to call the damn car." In one such meeting the brainstorming stalled, and an impatient Shelby turned to Phil Remington, an engineer who was also instrumental in Shelby's Cobra and GT40 programs, and asked him "how far it was between our two shops, and he came back that it looked like about 350 feet. So there it was, the GT350—as easy as that."

At Willow Springs, Miles took the first laps in the Mustang, which was the first prototype built and carried Shelby serial number 5R002. "What really impressed us was that Ken was soon turning 1:40 [lap times]—faster than the existing A/Production times with the exception of the Team Cobras. He handed it over to us, and we were turning 1:41s within four laps. We were impressed, and plenty."

Titus praised the car's minimal understeer tendencies and said it was "quite easy to bring to dead neutral or even to a slight oversteer. Except for braking in a turn, it is an embarrassingly simple car to drive at competition speeds. Under full power, it uses quite a bit of road—a real drifter—but gets a surprising amount of bite when cornered in a neutral or closed-throttle attitude."

Miles eventually got his lap times down to a tick

below 1:40 before "an ominous howl developed in the rearend," Titus said, caused by differential bolts coming loose.

Titus foresaw a "bright future" for the GT350. "It is really a fun race car and should prove equally enjoyable in street form."

Miles and 5R002 won the very first SCCA B/Production race they entered on February 14, 1965, barely a month after those Willow Springs shakedown runs. He was famously photographed going over a bump with all four wheels off the ground, earning 5R002 the nickname "The Flying Mustang."

Soon after his article appeared, Titus was hired as Shelby's team driver and won the SCCA's national championship in 1965. GT350s also won SCCA championships in 1966 and 1967.

LATER EVOLUTIONS

In that first year of production, Shelby American built 526 street GT350s and 36 competition mod-

els. At a list price of nearly \$6,000, the race cars were a hard sell, despite their on-track success. No more were made. Shelby continued to build street GT350s, and later big-block-powered GT500 models, until 1970, though with each successive year the cars got further away from their pure competition roots. They evolved into posh grand touring versions of the Mustang, though Shelby insisted—even in the later years when Ford took over production—that the cars have distinctive styling that immediately identified them as Shelby models.

All Shelby Mustangs are collectible. The '65 GT350s hold a special place among collectors, given their low production numbers and how closely they followed the car's original racing intent. After a distinguished competition career and an even longer life as a restored show car, prototype 5R002 sold at Dana Mecum's 2022 Kissimmee, Florida, auction for \$3.75 million. **S**

Step 2 – Write Your Letters

Your letter doesn't need to be long. Even 3 sentences make a difference. ***If PICC touched your life, please share your story or explain why you care. This is the part that will give your letter impact.*** These templates provide a general idea of the points to stress but make the letter your own.

Simple Version (3–4 sentences)

Dear [Legislator],

I care deeply about drug-exposed newborns. PICC has given a safe and healthy start to more than 3,500 babies over the past 35 years. Please restore funding and placements for PICC in the next legislative session.

Thank you, [Your Name]

Expanded Version (with talking points)

Dear [Legislator],

As your constituent, I urge you to protect drug-exposed infants.

- These babies are among the most vulnerable in our community.

- PICC is the only transitional care center for newborns across the Puget Sound.

- Over 35 years, PICC has given a safe start to 3,500+ infants and supported thousands of families.

- Defunding PICC and cancelling placements was a grave mistake.

- The legislature must act in the next session to restore PICC.

They would start in Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada and then swap between the US and Canada each year. During that first year, there were three clubs and 75 cars, and the Labor Day weekend was chosen to allow for travel to the meet each year.

Today, the event has become more than a car show. There are 300-500 vehicles each year that gather on Labor Day weekend, and is a social event reuniting friendships made through the years. Friday night begins with a Welcome Party; Saturday is the show day followed by a BBQ in the evening. On Sunday there could be a special drive, potential Auto Cross or Poker Run, and ends with an Awards Banquet. Finally, we gather for breakfast on Monday morning and say goodbye until next year.
